Financial Statements

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Trustees' Annual Report

Year ended 31 December 2021

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021.

Objectives and activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

In St Andrew's Church, services of worship take place each Sunday at 11am, and each Wednesday at 11.00am. The sacrament of baptism is administered as requested and there are six Celebrations of Holy Communion annually. It is expected that there will also be a 9.30am service monthly when Covid restrictions are lifted completely.

The Guild meets every Monday afternoon from October until April.

Memory Lane, a group for adults suffering from dementia and their supporters, meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month, and attracts clients from all sections of the community. Transport is provided where required to bring clients to meetings.

Organisations for younger people meet as follows:

Junior Church (Sunday School) meets each Sunday during the morning service.

7th Barrhead Guides and Rainbows meet on Tuesday evenings and the Brownies meet on Thursday evenings.

1st Barrhead Boys' Brigade Company Junior and Anchor Sections meet each Thursday at 6.30 pm. The Company Section meets at 7.00pm.

3rd Barrhead Scout Group meets in the new Community Hall, with different sections meeting on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

The Online Church continues to attract a substantial number of viewers to the Sunday services. When funeral services are held in the church, families are offered the opportunity to have these services streamed on the church website.

Achievements and performance

The church buildings are used regularly by various church groups and youth organisations (Junior Church, Crèche, Boys' Brigade, Guides, Brownies and Rainbows). The 3rd Barrhead Scout Group, which is affiliated to the church, also uses the church buildings. Various community groups including a Child Minders group, a Baby Sensory group, U3A, Yoga Classes and a Keep-Fit class use the premises on a weekly basis. Our new Community Hall, which is used by all the above groups, is available for hire to local groups and is also used for local and national elections.

The Barrhead Memory Lane Group, which is supported by St Andrew's Church members, also meets in our new hall.

The Spirit of Life Church also hold weekly services in St Andrew's buildings.

The Main Street building is no longer used and has been advertised for sale. At the time of writing we await confirmation of the sale of the building.

Members of the congregation maintain their support, working with other churches in the town, for the fundraising toward provision of school facilities in Kibera, Nairobi, Kenya. An annual Coffee Morning in St Andrew's Church normally raises a substantial sum for this project, with support from the local community.

Support is also given, both financially and through providing personnel, to the Barrhead Summer Club which provides for over 200 children during the first week of the school summer holidays.

Attendees at the Wednesday services have continued in a faithful way to contribute to the Church of Scotland HIV Worldwide programme. This year, Teen Challenge, working for the rehabilitation of drug users, is also supported through the sale of sweets at various services and at the Guild. As well as local charities, members of the congregation continue to support the Lodging House Mission in Glasgow, Erskine Hospital, Salvation Army and Mary's Meals.

The church website, 'www.barrhead-standrewschurch.org.uk' provides information about the church, its organisations and ongoing activities, as well as hosting the online service provision.

On a weekly basis the minister distributes, via email, 'The Inside Look', an online newsletter of church activities, The church also has a Facebook site which has many followers.

Financial review

The principal sources of income are regular weekly / monthly offerings and giving on our annual Gift Day, together with associated tax able to be recovered through the HMRC Gift Aid scheme and GASD scheme.

Some 50 households give utilising Freewill Offering envelopes and about 120 give by Banker's Standing Order. Some 25% of households who give using Freewill Offering envelopes result in a tax recovery, while 90% of households who give using banker's standing order result in a tax recovery.

At 31 December 2021, the number of members on the communion roll was 315, along with 29 adherents. In addition, there are 140 persons on a supplementary roll, because we have neither an address nor contact with them.

Based upon the number of members and adherents, the average giving per person was £5.64 per week, as against £5.25 in 2020.

While our expenditure has exceeded our income by approximately £2,900 in 2021, this has been due, to a large extent, to grants towards the building of our new hall. We still had the expense of maintaining two church buildings but it is anticipated that the Main Street Building will be sold in the early part of 2022.

However, both our main church building and our manse will require substantial spending in 2022. We anticipate part of the revenue from the sale of the Main Street Building will be used to fund these items; we will therefore have to maintain strict discipline over spending in 2022.

Reserves Policy

It has been the Trustees intention to ensure sufficient reserve funds are available to meet general ongoing repairs and foreseeable reasonable and necessary expenditure.

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately three months expenditure including designated funds.

At the year end the church holds unrestricted reserves of £650,656, of which £200,000 represents Manse Asset Fund, £418,032 represents Hall Asset Fund and a further £11,423 represents other designated funds together with a balance of £21,201 in the General Fund.

These are as detailed in Note 19 to these financial statements.

The church also held £271,455 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 19.

All our funds held with the Church of Scotland Investor's Trust and Trustees have now been realised.

Risk Management

The Kirk Session has reviewed and considered the major risks to which the Church is exposed, covering personnel, the infrastructure, child abuse and financial aspects and is satisfied that such risks are manageable having considered the systems and processes in place.

Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC015730, and has been administered in accordance with the terms of the Model Deed of Constitution and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly.

From 1 January 2022, the Unitary Constitution will be adopted.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board were the charity trustees in 2021. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, Rev Tim Mineard is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Congregational Board was appointed from within the congregation and members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals, who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church, to become members of the Board. Board Members were then appointed at the Stated Annual Meeting and served for a period of three years.

Organisational Structure

The Session meets five times a year. It is responsible for spiritual affairs within the church. There are 32 ordained elders who are active members of the Session together with the minister. The minister is the Moderator of the Kirk Session.

To assist it to fulfil its obligations, the Kirk Session has created five sub-groups: Business Committee, Pastoral Care, Session, Education, and Outreach and Hospitality.

The Congregational Board consists of elders and members of the congregation and meets five times in a year. The Board is chaired by one of its members, currently Mr Peter Inglis. The Board currently has 22 members, 12 of whom are elders. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee and the Property Committee as appropriate.

Barrhead St Andrew's is a 'Union' (06/06/2013) of the previous congregations of Arthurlie Parish Church of Scotland. Barrhead and Barrhead: South & Levern Church of Scotland.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 December 2021

1. General information

The charity is a registered charity in Scotland and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is Ralston Road, Barrhead, G78 2QQ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charity Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets. Barrhead St Andrew's Parish Church of Scotland meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.

Going concern - COVID 19

Since 31 December 2019, the spread of COVID-19 has severely impacted many local economies around the globe. In many countries, businesses are being forced to cease or limit operations for long or indefinite periods of time.

The duration and impact of COVID-19 pandemic, as well as the effectiveness of government and central bank responses, remains unclear at this time. It is not possible to reliably estimate the duration and severity of these consequences, as well as their impact on the financial position and results of the charity for future periods.

Despite this uncertainty the trustees are working hard to manage cash resources, with bank support, to ensure as far as possible that the charity can trade through this difficult period.

Disclosure exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102:

(a) No cash flow statement has been presented for the charity.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Notes to the Financial Statements

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

Legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.

Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Donated Services and Facilities

Donated professional services and facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Taxation

Barrhead St Andrew's Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church and a number of its halls, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

The charity has completed the new church halls at Ralston Road. These halls, together with the church manse are not vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. Once the halls have been completed it is the intention of the trustees of the charity to provide depreciation on a straight-line basis to write off the cost, less residual value, of the halls over their estimated useful lives.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all Ministers' stipends and employers contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £28,700 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years) £35,269.
