Trustees' Annual Report

For the Year Ended 31 December 2025

The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

In St Andrew's Church, services of worship take place each Sunday at 11.00am, and each Wednesday at 11.00am. The sacrament of baptism is administered as requested and there are five Celebrations of Holy Communion annually at 11.00am services.

The Guild meets every Monday afternoon from October until April.

Memory Lane, a group for adults suffering from dementia and their supporters, meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month, and attracts clients from all sections of the community. Transport is provided where required to bring clients to meetings.

Organisations for younger people meet as follows:

Junior Church (Sunday School) meets each Sunday during the morning service.

1st Barrhead Boys' Brigade Company Junior and Anchor Sections meet each Thursday at 6.30pm. The Company Section meets at 7.00pm.

The Online Church continues to attract a substantial number of viewers to the Sunday Services. When funeral services are held in the Church, families are offered the opportunity to have these services streamed on the Church website.

Achievements and Performance

As a Church we continue to celebrate God's ongoing faithfulness and goodness to us over the past 12 months. We have been delighted to welcome new people into our Church family during this time, and are encouraged that we continue to see new faces on a regular basis. A particular highlight was the Easter Sunday service when we celebrated the baptism of 4 people and also welcomed almost 20 people into membership. This followed on from a successful Alpha course during the Spring of 2025.

Our members continue to show their generosity through both their financial giving and also through the giving of their time and talents. It is a real blessing to know that we are one of the most generous congregations across Clyde Presbytery, and is a powerful indication of our members putting their faith into action. We have been particularly encouraged by the response to our roof replacement project over the past 12 months. God has provided generously through the financial sacrifice of our members, and also through a range of Trusts and other grant making bodies, in particular the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. We are deeply thankful for this provision, and also for the efforts of the small team leading on this work. We anticipate this project moving to completion over the coming year.

Faced with such a significant level of expenditure, it would be easy to become inward looking and to focus all of our efforts on the renewal of our buildings. However, we remain firmly committed to looking outwards in mission and ministry to our local community, and this is a real testament to the faith of the Kirk Session in particular. This past year saw an ongoing commitment to funding our Youth & Community Worker, with significant funds pledged from our free reserves and also from external funding sources including Seeds for Growth. We have been encouraged by the growing numbers of young people engaging both within and outside the church, and look forward to seeing how this post will develop in 2026. We continue to hold free activities and events for the local community, including a Summer holiday club in August. These are complemented by our regular outreach activities, such as our fortnightly Memory Lane dementia café and our free soup lunch. We are immensely grateful for all the volunteers who help to make these events so welcoming and vibrant.

Our buildings continue to be a major asset both for ourselves and also for the local community. As a Church we are delighted to support two external youth organisations with free accommodation, and very much value our ongoing relationship with 7th Barrhead Guiding and 3rd Barrhead Scouts. Our own Boys Brigade Company (1st Barrhead BB) continues to thrive, and all three organisations are an absolute credit to the dedication and commitment of their leaders.

The life of our Church is about so much more than just what happens on a Sunday morning, and our buildings are often busy with a wide range of activities taking place. Our own Church groups provide support and encouragement to a wide range of people, whether through the Guild, through fortnightly housegroups, our Worship on Wednesday (WoW) service or in a range of other ways. Our Minister continues to serve the community through the provision of parish funerals, and also as a chaplain to Hillview Primary School.

We are deeply committed to working together ecumenically with our neighbouring congregations, and continue to value our involvement with ABC (Action of Barrhead Churches). We hope and pray for a clear pathway forward for our local Church of Scotland congregations in the coming year.

Achievements and Performance (continued)

Members of the Church are kept up to date with all that is happening in the congregation in a range of ways. In particular, our activities are widely advertised through our website (www.barrhead-standrewschurch.org.uk) and our Facebook page (www.facebook.com/barrheadstandrews). Our e-newsletter the Inside Look is also delivered weekly to over 100 individuals connected with the church, giving a range of news and information to people.

Financial Review

The principal sources of income are regular weekly/monthly offerings and giving on our annual Gift Day, together with associated tax able to be recovered through the HMRC Gift Aid scheme and GASD scheme.

Some 30 households give utilising Freewill Offering envelopes and about 130 give by Banker's Standing Order. Some 25% of households who give using Freewill Offering envelopes result in a tax recovery, while 90% of households who give using banker's standing order result in a tax recovery.

At 31 December 2025, the number of members on the communion roll was 277, along with 15 adherents. In addition, there are 135 persons on a supplementary roll, because we have neither an address nor contact with them.

Based upon the number of members and adherents, the average giving per person was £6.98 per week, as against £7.02 in 2024.

The Fabric Care Group is anticipating the need for considerable spending on the church building over the next few years.

Reserves Policy

It has been the Trustees intention to ensure sufficient reserve funds are available to meet general ongoing repairs and foreseeable reasonable and necessary expenditure.

The charity Trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately three months expenditure including designated funds.

At the year end the Church holds unrestricted funds of £1,261,954 of which £325,000 represents Manse Asset Fund, £593,312 represents Hall Asset Fund and a further £245,527 represents other designated funds together with a balance of £98,115 in the General Fund. These are as detailed in Note 20 to these financial statements.

The Church also held £77,089 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified In Note 20.

Risk Management

The Kirk Session has reviewed and considered the major risks to which the Church is exposed, covering personnel, the infrastructure, child abuse and financial aspects and is satisfied that such risks are manageable having considered the systems and processes in place.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC015730, and has been administered in accordance with the terms of the Model Deed of Constitution and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly.

From 1 January 2022, the Unitary Constitution was adopted.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity Trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, Rev. Tim Mineard is a member of the Kirk Session, was elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery.

Organisational Structure

The Session meets five times a year. It is responsible for spiritual affairs within the Church. There are 30 ordained elders who are active members of the Session with the minister. The minister is the Moderator of the Kirk Session.

Under the Unitary Constitution, there are five core groups with responsibility for fulfilling relevant functions. They are "Worship and Discipleship", "Mission and Outreach", "Nurture and Fellowship", "Fabric" and "Financial Stewardship". These groups meet regularly as required and their conveners meet as the "Leadership Team", prior to Session Meetings.

Barrhead St Andrew's is a "Union" (06/06/2013) of the previous congregations of Arthurlie Parish Church of Scotland, Barrhead and Barrhead: South & Lavern Church of Scotland.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Barrhead: St Andrew's Parish Church of Scotland

For the Year Ended 31 December 2025

I report to the Trustees on my examination of the financial statements of Barrhead: St Andrew's Parish Church of Scotland ("the charity") for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity's Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10 (1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply.

It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of the Independent Examiner's Report

My examination was carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from you as Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2025

1 General Information

The charity is a registered charity in Scotland and is unincorporated. The registered office address is 3 Cruachan Way, Barrhead, G78 2LG.

2 Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland", the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charity Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

3 Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets. Barrhead St Andrew's Parish Church of Scotland meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Disclosure Exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined by FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102: - no cash flow statement has been presented for the charity.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for a particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subject to restriction on their expenditure by the donor or through the terms of an appeal and fall into one of the two sub classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

Legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.

3 Accounting Policies (continued)

Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Donated Services and Facilities

Donated professional services and facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Taxation

Barrhead St Andrew's Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

3 Accounting Policies (continued)

Tangible Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church and a number of its halls, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

The charity has completed the new church halls at Ralston Road. These halls, together with the church manse are not vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. The halls are depreciated on a straight line basis to write off the cost, less residual value, of the halls over their estimated useful lives.
